ENVIRONMENT & NATURE: Permanent fishing and hunting license for honorably discharged veterans. Creates a permanent combination hunting and fishing license for each resident of Tennessee who is an honorably discharged veteran on the United States armed forces for a onetime \$10 fee.

House Finance Subcommittee amendment 1 (006613) deletes and replaces the amended language such that the only substantive change is to specify that the theft of firearms valued at \$2,500 or more, rather than over than \$2,500, are required to be graded pursuant to Tenn. Code Ann. § 39-14-105(a)(3)-(6).

43. **HB135** Love Jr. H.

CRIMINAL LAW: Offense of reckless endangerment by discharging a firearm into a parade or religious service. Creates a Class C felony offense of reckless endangerment when someone discharges a firearm into a parade, religious service, concert, athletic event, political event, educational event, or into any other group of 25 or more people who are lawfully assembled.

Amendment Summary: Senate Judiciary Committee amendment 1, House Judiciary Committee amendment 1 (004918) declares exemption to the crime of reckless endangerment by discharging a firearm if done by a member of a law enforcement agency or any branch of the military acting in the course of a person's official duties, involves the firing of non-live ammunition as part of a funeral, or occurs in a location where participants have assumed the risk of the activity involving the discharge of a firearm, including group hunting activities.

CRIMINAL LAW: JaJuan Latham Act. Enacts the "JaJuan Latham Act," which increases the penalty for any aggravated assault or homicide that occurs by a person discharging a firearm from within a motor vehicle and the victim is a minor at the time of the offense.

CRIMINAL LAW: Handgun carry permits for persons in military stationed out of state. Requires the department of safety to issue a handgun VanHuss carry permit containing zeros in place of an expiration date upon request by a permit holder or applicant who is in the armed forces and stationed outside the state.

Amendment Summary: Senate amendment 1, House Judiciary Committee amendment 1 (002600) rewrites this bill to require that the following language is printed on the back of handgun carry permit cards: This permit is valid beyond the expiration date if the permit holder can provide documentation of the holder's active military status and duty station outside Tennessee. The provisions of this amendment will take effect on the earlier of: (1) 30 days after the date upon which the commissioner of safety provides written notification to the secretary of state and the executive secretary of the Tennessee code commission that the department of safety's "A-list" driver license program is capable of implementing this act; or (2) January 1, 2020.

Fiscal Note: (Dated January 29, 2019) Other Fiscal Impact To the extent redesign of the handgun carry permit card can be accomplished with one of two available allowances permitted by the current third party vendor contract, any impact would be not significant. Otherwise, redesign of the card will result in a one-time state expenditure estimated to exceed \$15,000.

38. **HB1264** Holt A.

CRIMINAL LAW: Creates a concealed handgun carry permit. Creates a concealed handgun carry permit, which allows a person to carry a concealed handgun. Redesignates the existing handgun carry permit as an enhanced handgun carry permit.

Amendment Summary: House Judiciary Committee amendment 1 (004571) removes direct references to the NRA, removes participation in organized shooting competitions as handgun competence demonstration, requires the county sheriff to verify eligibility requirements for handgun license applicants, requires the TBI conduct nationwide background checks with applicant fingerprints forwarded from DOS, increases time handgun carry permits are valid to from five to eight years, requires the issuance of the permit into a laminated card with photo id, physical identifiers, permit number, and issuance and expiration date, establishes requirements for firearms training or safety courses, and changes the effective date to January 1, 2020. Orders a CCHP be issued on a wallet-sized laminated card the same approximate size as driver licenses with the holder's name, address, date of birth, physical description, permit number, issuance, expiration dates, and a color photograph. Deletes and replaces language of the legislation without making any substantive changes. Senate Judiciary Committee amendment 1 (005998) deletes and rewrites all language after the enacting clause such that the only substantive changes are as follows: (1) requires a CCHP applicant to provide DOS with two sets of fingerprints, (2) requires an application and processing fee of \$65 to DOS, (3) requires DOS to forward the fingerprints to the Tennessee Bureau of Investigation (TBI) who shall conduct searches and record checks on the application and relay the results to DOS, (4) requires DOS to send a copy of the application to the sheriff of the county in which the applicant resides, (5) changes the period in which a CCHP is valid from 5 years to 8 years, (6) requires a CCHP be issued on a wallet-sized laminated card the same approximate size as driver licenses with the holder's name, address, date of birth, physical description, permit number, issuance and expiration dates, and a color photograph, and (7) changes the effective date from upon becoming law to January 1, 2020. House Finance Committee amendment 1 (005134) deletes and rewrites all language after the enacting clause such that the only substantive changes are as follows: (1) requires a CCHP applicant to provide DOS with two sets of fingerprints, (2) requires an application and processing fee of \$65 to DOS, (3) requires DOS to forward the fingerprints to the Tennessee Bureau of Investigation (TBI) who shall conduct searches and record checks on the application and relay the results to DOS, (4) requires DOS to send a copy of the application to the sheriff of the county in which the applicant resides. (5) changes the period in which a CCHP is valid from five years to eight years, (6) requires a CCHP be issued on a wallet-sized laminated card of the same approximate size as driver licenses with the holder's name, address, date of birth, physical description, permit number, issuance and expiration dates, and a color photograph, and (7) changes the effective date from upon becoming law to January 1, 2020.

One if the existing permit which is being redesignated as an "enhanced" permit. The other would be issued based on lower testing and fees and would be a concealed only permit. Also, there is a concern regarding how many states may terminate reciprocity based on the dual permitting proposal.

10. **SB403** Stevens J.

CRIMINAL LAW: Mandatory sentence for theft of a firearm. Requires a mandatory 30-day sentence for firearm theft, creates the Class D felony offense of bringing weapons, controlled substances or telecommunication devices into a penal institution, allows those with revoked or restricted driver license due solely to being habitual offender may petition the court that originally revoked their license to reinstate the person's driver license.

Amendment Summary: Senate Judiciary Committee amendment 1 (004195) changes the effective date for sections 1, 2 and 3 to January 1, 2020. Senate Judiciary Committee amendment 2 (004188) deletes and replaces all language after the enacting clause. Repeals the Motor Vehicle Habitual Offenders Act. Reduces failure to appear in court offenses for Class A misdemeanor violations. Revises the punishment for introduction of certain contraband in penal institutions. Requires a 30-day minimum confinement period for any person who is convicted of theft a firearm. Enhances the penalty for fifth DUI offenses. Removes the statute of limitations of certain convictions for consideration of DUI convictions. House amendment 1 (005918) deletes a provision of this bill that would have made possession of a telecommunications device in a penal institution without the chief administrator's consent a criminal offense. This amendment does not remove the present law offense of knowingly and with unlawful intent taking, sending, or otherwise causing to be taken into any penal institution where prisoners are quartered or under custodial supervision, which this bill increases in classification from a Class E felony to a Class D felony. This amendment changes the effective date of this bill's provision that authorizes a person whose driver license has been revoked or restricted due solely to the person's status as a motor vehicle habitual offender prior to July 1, 2019, to petition a court for reinstatement of the person's driver license. Under this amendment, instead of taking effect July 1, 2019, such provision will take effect 30 days after the date upon which the commissioner of safety provides written notification to the secretary of state and the executive secretary of the Tennessee code commission that the department of safety's "A-list" driver license program is capable of implementing this bill or January 1, 2020, whichever is earlier. This amendment removes release eligibility for a person who commits DUI, on or after January 1, 2019, if the person has at least six prior DUI convictions. This amendment requires that any such person serve 100 percent of the sentence imposed by the court less sentence credits earned and retained, not to exceed a reduction in the sentence of more than 15 percent. House amendment 2 (008290) adds that the judges of chancery and circuit courts have statewide jurisdiction to issue search warrants in any district. Senate Finance, Ways & Means Committee amendment 1 (007440) deletes all language after the enacting clause. Repeals the Motor Vehicle Habitual Offenders Act. Reduces failure to appear in court offenses for Class A misdemeanor violations. Revises the punishment for introduction of certain contraband in penal institutions. Requires a 30-day minimum confinement period for any person who is convicted of theft of a firearm. Enhances the penalty for fifth DUI offenses. Removes the statute of limitations of certain convictions for consideration of DUI convictions. Requires individuals with seven or subsequent DUI convictions to serve 100 percent of the sentence imposed by the court less sentence credits not to exceed 15 percent. Authorizes the sheriff or chief administrative officer of a local jail or workhouse to use alternative facilities for the incarceration of an offender convicted of DUI. Changes the effective date of the authorization of a person whose driver license was revoked or restricted as a result of the Motor Vehicle Habitual Offender Act to petition a court for reinstatement of the person's driver license to 30 days after the date upon which the Commissioner of the Department of Safety provides written notification to the Secretary of State and the Executive Secretary of the Tennessee Code Commission that the Department's "A-list" driver license program is capable of implementing the act or January 1, 2020, whichever is earlier.

55. **SB1402** Bell M.

CRIMINAL LAW: Firearm prohibitions for persons suffering from mental illness. Prohibits certain persons voluntarily admitted to a mental health treatment facility from possessing a firearm.

<u>Amendment Summary:</u> Senate Judiciary Committee amendment 1, House amendment 2 (007680) rewrites this bill to create a Class A misdemeanor offense for the transfer of a firearm to a person knowing that the person: (1) Has been judicially committed to a mental institution or adjudicated as a mental defective unless the person's right to possess firearms has been restored; or (2) Is receiving inpatient mental health or substance abuse treatment at a hospital or treatment resource.
