SB35/HB135 CRIMINAL LAW: Offense of reckless endangerment by discharging a firearm into a parade or religious service.

Summary: Creates a Class C felony offense of reckless endangerment when someone discharges a firearm into a parade, religious service, concert, athletic event, political event, educational event, or into any other group of 25 or more people who are lawfully assembled.

Amendment Summary: Senate Judiciary Committee amendment 1, House Judiciary Committee amendment 1 (004918) declares exemption to the crime of reckless endangerment by discharging a firearm if done by a member of a law enforcement agency or any branch of the military acting in the course of a person's official duties, involves the firing of non-live ammunition as part of a funeral, or occurs in a location where participants have assumed the risk of the activity involving the discharge of a firearm, including group hunting activities. Summary: Creates a Class A misdemeanor offense of leaving a firearm or firearm ammunition unattended with a minor in a motor vehicle or boat, if the firearm is not securely locked away.

Amendment Summary: House Constitutional Protections & Sentencing Subcommittee amendment 1 (007099) rewrites the bill to (1) create a Class A misdemeanor for leaving a firearm in a motor vehicle or boat that is unattended or with a person under the age of 18, unless the firearm is kept from ordinary observation or kept within the trunk, glovebox, or container securely affixed, and (2) establish that such an offense is punishable only by a fine of not less than \$500, which shall be credited to the General Fund.

Summary: Allows any family member, household member, intimate partner, or law enforcement officer who reasonably believes a person is at risk of harming others if in possession of a firearm to file an emergency order of protection against that person. Upon filing the petition, the courts can immediately issue an ex parte emergency protection order, which will prohibit the person from purchasing or owning a firearm during the time of the protective order. Requires a hearing to be held within 30 days of order's issuance at which time the court may dissolve or extend the protective order for up to one year. Creates a Class A misdemeanor for a violation of an emergency order of protection. Establishes other requirements for an emergency protection order. Broadly captioned.

SB1985/HB2027 CRIMINAL LAW: Extends validity of enhanced handgun permits.

Summary: Extends the validity of enhanced handgun carry permits issued on or after January 1, 2021 for the duration of the permit holder's life. Requires the department of safety to run a name based criminal history check every five years to determine if the permit holder continues to meet requirements and if not, the department must revoke or suspend the permit. Creates other requirements regarding the suspension of a permit.

Amendment Summary: House Judiciary Committee amendment 1 (014980) deletes and replaces all language after the enacting clause. Increases the number of name-based criminal history background checks run on handgun permit holders from every five years to every four years. Broadens the ability of a permit holder to prove a delivered renewal permit application by deleting the requirement that the permit holder provide a receipt of the renewal application fee.

TFA believes that this bill could be used, if amended, to make all currently existing and future "enhanced" permits lifetime permits. It should also be amended to make clear that a TN handgun permit does not expire or terminate if the person moves out of state.

Summary: Allows an LEA or school that offers a firearm safety class or program to elementary school students to post the curriculum and educational materials on the school's or LEA's website.

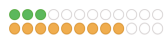
