# SB1315/HB1478 CRIMINAL LAW: Reckless endangerment.

Sen. Kyle, Sara Rep. Hardaway, G.A.

> Revises definition of reckless endangerment to include use of a motor vehicle to harass, injure, or obstruct another person. Establishes penalties for reckless endangerment committed by discharging a firearm into a group of two or more people from a vehicle, or into a vehicle as a fine between \$5,000 and \$10,000 and a five-year revocation of a driver's license following release. Permits petition for a restricted driver's license for people whose license has been revoked under these terms. Clarifies that each person endangered by a reckless endangerment violation constitutes as a separate offense. Requires defendants convicted of reckless endangerment with a deadly weapon to attend anger management class. Establishes the crime of community terrorism as a gang-related offense committed against a population by members of a criminal gang

and enhances punishment for crimes falling under this designation.

#### SB1807/HB1873 CRIMINAL LAW: Allows temporary removal of guns from at-risk owners.

AN ACT to amend Tennessee Code Annotated, Title 39; Title 49 and Title 50, relative to firearms.

Summary: Allows any family member, household member, intimate partner, or law enforcement officer who reasonably believes a person is at risk of harming others if in possession

of a firearm to file an emergency order of protection against that person. Upon filing the petition, the courts can immediately issue an ex parte emergency protection order, which will prohibit the person from purchasing or owning a firearm during the time of the protective order. Requires a hearing to be held within 30 days of order's issuance at which time the court may dissolve or extend the protective order for up to one year. Creates a Class A misdemeanor for a violation of an emergency order of protection.

run a name based criminal history check every five years to determine if the permit holder continues to meet requirements and if not, the department must revoke or
