SB7001/HB7002 EDUCATION: Fire alarm activated at school due to presence of active shooter.

Sen. Haile, Ferrell Rep. Lamberth, William

Summary:

Requires each LEA, public charter school, private school, and church-related school to develop a policy to direct how students, teachers, substitute teachers, and staff are to respond when a fire alarm is activated on school premises outside of a scheduled fire drill to protect students, teachers, substitute teachers, and staff in the event the fire alarm was activated due to the presence of an active shooter on school premises.

SB7002/HB7016 CRIMINAL LAW: Creates the criminal offense of threatening to commit an act of mass violence.

Creates a Class E felony offense of recklessly, by any means of communication, threatening to commit an act of mass violence. Specifies that if the the offense involves a threat to commit an act of mass violence on the property of a school, house of worship, or a federal, state, or local government then a violation is a Class D felony. Requires the court to determine whether a defendant charged with threatening to commit an act of mass violence is a threat to the public prior to release on bail.

The classification is enhanced to a Class D felony if: (1) the violation involves threatening tocommit an act of mass violence on the property of a school, a house of worship, or a federal, state, or local government, at a live performance, or at a place that is open to the public andaverages 250 or more visitors per day; (2) the defendant has one or more prior convictions forsuch offense or a Class A misdemeanor threat of mass violence on a school property underTenn. Code Ann. 39-16-517; or (3) the defendant has taken a substantial step towards carryingout an act of mass violence. Requires, as a condition of bail or other pretrial release, a court to order a defendant chargedwith threatening to commit an act of mass violence to undergo a mental health evaluation todetermine whether the defendant poses a substantial likelihood of serious harm to the person orothers. Requires the Department of Safety (DOS) to create a behavioral risk assessment, whichmay be used by the court in determining whether the defendant is a threat to the public. Authorizes a sentencing court to order a person convicted of threatening to commit an act ofmass violence to pay restitution, including costs and damages resulting from the disruption ofthe normal activity that would have otherwise occurred but for the threat to commit an act ofmass violence. Prohibits a defendant charged with threatening an act of mass violence from being released onbail unless authorized by a judge. Effective January 1, 2024. As of August 2023, \$64,575,000 in SRO Program Grants have been issued. To the extent that additional SRO Program Grants are awarded, there will be an increase in state expenditures from the SRO Grant Fund. The net local fiscal impact is estimated to be not significant.
